The first day was allotted for the four (4) divisions to conduct their respective preparations and report consolidations. Each performed stakeholder division and individual accomplishment reports, and leadership capital evaluation, among others. The next two days were presentation allotted for the accomplishments for the previous and current year and their respective plans for the next 3 years.

Director Moraga-Leaño, in her welcome remarks, vowed to intensify the Institute's efficiency by extending its programs and services to micro, small, and medium enterprises in the country despite the challenges posed by the global health crisis. According to her, there is a dire need to provide extension services to enterprises as they transition to the new normal in doing business by sustaining existing partnerships and by being strategic about allocating the Institute's resources.

The resource person, Asst. Prof. Mikhael Angelu Magana, a faculty member at the UP Cesar EA Virata School of Business, shared the basics of Accounting that MSMEs may be able to easily understand and apply their businesses. He discussed what Accounting is, the types of business organizations, the accounting equation and assumptions, transaction financial analysis, statements and available accounting and systems software.

Prof. Rolando Ramon C. Diaz. Head of the <u>Administrative</u> Delivery Division of UP **ISSI** delivered his closing remarks in closing the first session. He stressed on the importance of Accounting in business transactions and financial enhancing the literacy among MSMEs.

The second session brought out the creative juices of the participants as this session focused on another equally important aspect of business today, Content and Digital Marketing, which will enable the MSMEs build their online presence in various social media and platforms. Vice Chancellor for Community Affairs, Prof. Aleli B. Bawagan, shared the research done by UP ISSI on the effects of the pandemic to MSMEs and stressed the importance of having an online presence and letting the world know about your product in the various social media and digital platforms.

The resource person on Digital and Content Marketing is the Founder and Chief Creative Officer of Vitalstrats Creative Solution, Ms. Amrei Dizon, CPM, ME. In this session, Ms. Dizon discussed about how to increase sales through digital and content marketing. She encouraged and challenged the participants to stay curious. The highlighted topics shared during the session were reviewing consumer behavior, creating simple digital campaign, and learning the best practices.

The second day was closed by Mr. Reynold Ferdinand G. Manegdeg, Head of the Business Enterprise Development Division of UP ISSI with the emphasis on the value of time in the business. He also reiterated the importance of market segmentation to reach the right market.

On the third day of the webinar series, four notable entrepreneurs who braved the pandemic shared their experiences in running their businesses and how they thrive in the new normal. Vice Chancellor for Research and Development, Prof. Gonzalo A. Campoamor II, highlighted UP ISSI's continuous service delivery since the start of the pandemic. He encouraged the participants to listen to the stories of the guest MSMEs and together learn from them.

The first speaker, Mr. Teejay Jamiang, is a freelance AI/VR and game developer and the Head Drifting Officer of Driftito Academy, a go cart business. It started as a retail/distributorship and expanded to cart rental/racetrack business. He stressed on the importance of not leaving your day job right away while starting a business to ensure a steady cashflow, building a team which will complement and fill in the gaps needed in sustaining the business and identifying the SWOT.

The Head Chef and creator of the Filipinothemed menu of Kaulayaw Café, Chef Allysa Janine Niño, shared their journey from starting with an online store, pop-up booth to opening their café and branching out during the pandemic. She shared that opening a business during the pandemic is very risky, but it is feasible and worth it. Kaulayaw supports local farmers and their local community by hiring working Day 2: Growing Your Sales through Content and Digital Marketing. students, breadwinners, and members of the Pantawid Pamilyang Pilipino Program (4Ps). She also shared what she learned from the new normal: adapt to the new normal, innovate and invest in research and development, be open, resilient, hardworking, and faithful.

Ms. Nicole Dela Peña-Charpentier, co-founder of Kuya Crêpes, a French and Filipino brand – bringing authentic crêpe French experience from France to Manila. They started at the start of the pandemic by sending out and donating crêpes to medical frontliners with the codename Kuya Crêpes. She gave emphasis on going digital and joining communities and engaging with customers. vour Another important lesson she shared was to accept, adapt and recalibrate; and make use of whatever resources you have for the business and do continuous improvement over time. And lastly, she advised fellow entrepreneurs to focus on quality more than anything and do not sacrifice the quality over the price.





The last entrepreneur guest was Mr. Mikko Cordova, a graduate of UP ISSI's Start Your Own Business Course and the founder and owner of Daddy Mikks Chili Crunch. His business started during a challenge in his life where he needed to lose weight for his upcoming wedding and discovered that eating spicy foods would help him a lot. As they were building their family, their initial business was falling. He made use of his remaining funds to start Daddy Mikks. One lesson he shared was the importance of having a good support team – his family, who then encouraged him to pursue this business. He also firmly believed that when a door closes, a window of opportunities opens.

To close the three-day webinar series, Ms. Melanie V. Cabotaje, Officer-in-Charge of UP ISSI's Research Division, delivered the synthesis and highlighted faith and hope despite and amidst the global pandemic and challenges. Ms. Glennis S. Uyanguren, Head of the Training and Entrepreneurship Education of UP ISSI, provided her closing message thanking everyone who supported the webinar series. She left the challenge to bounce back better and thrive in the new normal.

# Small Business Counsellors Course (SBCC)

#### **2021 Special Training Programs**

The Small Business Counsellors Course (SBCC) is a series of five-day training designed specifically for the Negosyo Center Business Counsellors (NCBC) and conducted in partnership with the Department of Trade and Industry (DTI). The SBCC 101: Diagnosing an Enterprise introduces the participants to the different principles and methods used to diagnose the viability, productivity, profitability, and sustainability of an enterprise. SBCC 103: Strategic Marketing is designed to develop the knowledge and skills of business counsellors in conducting sessions marketing, including marketing on management strategies, utilizing adultmethodologies facilitate learning to mentoring, and guiding MSMEs through changing value proposition conditions in the business environment.

SBCC 104: Operations Management is designed to develop the knowledge and skills of the participants in conducting sessions, including the use of diagnostic tools on productivity and efficiency to guide the MSMEs to make informed decisions on how to be competitive by providing quality products and services. SBCC 105: Financial Management is designed to develop the knowledge and skills of business counsellors in conducting sessions in financial management for entrepreneurship and investment.

As of 31 October 2021, a total of twelve SBCCs were conducted: five SBCC 101, three SBCC 103, three SBCC 104, and one SBCC 105. These were in partnerships with DTI CAR, DTI Region III, DTI Region V, DTI Region VIII, DTI Region IX, and DTI Region XII. A total of 602 Negosyo Center Business Counsellors participated and completed each of the abovementioned courses which were conducted through an online learning platform and UP ISSI's Virtual Learning Environment (VLE). Also scheduled for November is the conduct of two SBCC 102 for DTI Region XII and DTI Region IX.

The Training and Entrepreneurship Division conducted the first run of the Managers Course in an online platform. It was led by the Program Management Team composed of Maria Fe Reyes and Loida de Vera. The program which ran from April 17 to September 18, 2021, was participated by eighteen students coming from Metro Manila, Cavite, and Laguna.

The students shared that they joined the program for the following reasons: build their confidence as a manager, develop their potential as leaders that inspire people, learn advance techniques for

organizational development, and discover how they can better manage their business and people. The participants were given a practice their newfound chance to knowledge in Strategic Management, Marketing, Operations, HR, and Finance through the conduct of Integrated Organizational Survey and Assessment (IOSA) for companies. actual The companies that benefited from the IOSA were JOIE80 Soap Manufacturing, Min's Miraculous Mushroom, Creativly Studio, and CAR-OFEL Woodworks and General Merchandise.

# RD articulates MSMEs experiences amidst pandemic, other disasters in 3 studies

As majority of the micro, small and medium enterprise (MSME) sector is still heavily impacted by the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic and quarantine restrictions imposed by the Philippine government this year, the Research Division (RD) has conducted three studies that articulate the current realities and experiences of MSMEs amidst the pandemic and other natural and human-induced disasters.

## 1) Impacts of the COVID-19 Pandemic on Women in the Informal Economy in Quezon City

While everyone has been affected by the pandemic, the intensity of its impact has been far more overwhelming for the most vulnerable and marginalized sectors of our society. This study provides empirical evidence on the gendered impacts of the pandemic as experienced by women in the informal economy. It articulates how the pandemic exacerbates the pre-existing gender inequalities experienced by women in the informal economy. The research participants of this study are the members of three associations of informal workers in Quezon City: the Pambansang Kalipunan ng mga Manggagawang Impormal sa Pilipinas (PATAMABA), Inc.; the Metro Manila Vendors Alliance (MMVA); and the Samahang Manininda sa U.P. Campus, Inc. (UP Manininda). This study is funded by the UP Center for Women's and Gender Studies (UP CWGS).

#### 2) Case Study on the Effects of the UP Shopping Center Fire Incident on Its Concessionaires

This case study aims to assess the effects of the UP Shopping Center fire incident on its concessionaires. Specifically, it aims to gather information on (1) Disaster experiences and vulnerabilities of enterprises previously located in the UP Shopping Center, (2) Disaster preparedness and business continuity planning strategies of MSMEs. and (3) Support programs provided by the UP Administration, as well as other supporting agencies and institutions related to disaster risk reduction, rehabilitation and recovery. Aside from describing the effects of the UP Shopping Center Fire Incident on the business concessionaires. the survey also touches on the initial effects of the COVID-19 pandemic on the operations of MSMEs.

The scope of the study was extended to describe specific threats to business operations and business continuity and disaster preparedness strategies of the MSME sector in the Philippines.

This study is funded by the UP Diliman Office of the Vice Chancellor for Research and Development (OVCRD) through its Outright Research Grant.

# 3) Business Continuity and Sustainable Recovery of MSMEs in the Philippines: Basis for Developing an Enterprise Resilience Program

This study aims to describe the disaster experiences, impact to their business operations, disaster preparedness, and business continuityrelated practices of MSMEs in the Philippines. It also looks into the recovery challenges and strategies of MSMEs in relation to the COVID-19 pandemic situation. The results of this study will aid in the formulation of policies and development of programs related to community disaster risk reduction, and strategies for enterprise resilience. It will also serve as the UP ISSI's basis for improving its training program offerings for MSMEs related to business continuity planning and promoting enterprise resilience. This study is part of the project funded by the OVCRD through its Outright Research Grant.

RD worked with some of the staff from the Training and Entrepreneurship Education Division (TEED) and Business Enterprise Development Division (BEDD) for the conduct of the OVCRD-funded researches.

Based on the findings of these studies, the Institute will put forward policy recommendations aimed at helping the MSME sector recover and rebuild their enterprises. The RD is currently finalizing the reports of the three studies.

# UP ISSI studies, programs highlighted in local and int'l conferences

For the second half of the year, ISSI staff presented in a number of local and international conferences, highlighting the programs and results of research studies conducted by the Institute.

"Communities of Practice for Entrepreneurship: Building Forward towards a Better Normal"

Ms. Glennis S. Uyanguren and Ms. Allysa Anne M. De Guzman presented at the 4th Colleges and Universities Public Service Conference (CUPSCon) on October 22, 2021. Themed "Public Service in Time of COVID: The Role of Academic-Community Partnership in Addressing the Challenges of a Global Pandemic", the conference

centered on the significant role that partnerships between the academe and other institutions have played in the fight against COVID-19 and in empowering and building resilience amidst the global pandemic. Ms. Uyanguren and Ms. De Guzman presented the Institute's COPE Program, which brings entrepreneurship education to the people, particularly to communities who have lesser access to service through such social formal education. Citing the program as a proof of people's collective strength through shared learnings and experiences, Ms. Uyanguren and Ms. De Guzman discussed how partnerships among various sectors - such as the academe, MSME sector, public private institutions agencies and contribute to efforts to build forward particularly in this time of pandemic.

#### "Impacts of the COVID-19 Pandemic on Women in the Informal Economy in Quezon City"

Ms. Melanie V. Cabotaje presented at the UP Center for Women's and Gender Studies Research Dissemination Forum "Site of Convergence: Weaving Tapestries of Knowledge" on August 31, 2021 at 2:00 PM - 4:00 PM. Ms. Cabotaje presented the findings from the study of the Research "Impacts of the COVID-19 Division, Pandemic on Women in the Informal Economy in Quezon City". While the study reinforces what existing literature states about the gendered impacts of disasters, it also equally recognizes the agency and leadership of women in the informal economy. In her presentation, Cabotaje emphasized that when supportive environment. provided a proper tools and ample opportunities, women in the informal economy can come up with innovative solutions that will help them and their

enterprises/livelihoods thrive through this crisis, as well as lead in building sustainable and resilient communities.

#### "Lessons Learned from Enterprises Dealing with Compound Disasters"

The UP ISSI HANDA Program Management Team - Ms. Joanna Rose T. Laddaran and Ms. Glennis S. Uyanguren - presented at the Asia Risk and Resilience Conference 2021 on August 19, 2021. Ms. Laddaran and Ms. Uyanguren in their presentation, "Lessons Learned from Enterprises Dealing with Compound Disasters", discussed how compound disasters adversely affect the life, property and socioeconomic activities of MSMEs. Citing the case of business concessionaires who were still recovering from a major fire incident in 2018 and are now suffering from the COVID-19 pandemic and the subsequent quarantine restrictions, Ms. Laddaran and Ms. Uyanguren highlighted the need for an Enterprise Resilience Program for MSMEs in the Philippines. It also presented an analysis of the available support programs provided by the government, private sector, and other supporting agencies and institutions related to disaster risk reduction, and the sustainable recovery of MSMEs.

#### "Inclusivity in Business Continuity and Supply Chain Resilience: Lessons from Philippine MSMEs"

Ms. Joanna Rose T. Laddaran presented at the BCI World Horizons 2021 Conference on June 17, 2021. In her presentation, "Inclusivity in Business Continuity and Supply Chain Resilience: Lessons from Philippine MSMEs", Ms. Laddaran emphasized the need to ensure that Business Continuity Management (BCM) awareness and capacity-building inclusive, programs are localized, and context-based for MSMEs. She also put forward key recommendations on how to gain commitment of MSME owners and employees in embedding business continuity and enterprise resilience practices in their organization. The BCI World Horizons 2021 Conference was virtually conducted on June 16 - 17, 2021 with the theme, Facing the Future Together. The Conference centered on how business continuity and resilience professionals deal with the new challenges and the changed world we now live.

# UP ISSI ramps up its expertise on MSME productivity with an echo workshop

Reviving the Philippine economy has been unimaginably difficult kev actors like government, private sector, and relevant civil society organizations. To date. the pandemic has been the upsurge for the last 19 months now. It has claimed millions of jobs, taken more than forty thousand lives (and still counting), most formal impaired social institutions, turned the lives of families upside down and these times also led turbulent indefinitely halting the growth of MSMEs which contribute almost 40% of the country's Gross Domestic Product and provide 62% of its workforce.

Before the pandemic, the Philippines was one of the fastest-growing economies in the world. However, it is now barely recuperating from the damages of this global health crisis. Being cognizant of complex disruptions of this pandemic to the MSMEs and other related industries, the University of the Philippines Institute for Small-Scale Industries became more driven more than ever in personifying its dedication as a prime mover in helping the MSME sector to be resilient, relevant, and responsive to the times.

The UP ISSI sent a delegation to the concluded Workshop recently on Enhancing **Productivity** of **SMEs** sponsored and organized by the Asian Productivity Organization (APO) held last August 11-13, 2021. The delegation is composed of Mr. Reynold Fedinand G. Manegdeg, Head of the Enterprise Development Division and Mr. Jeffrey C. Sumalabe, University Extension Specialist II from the Research Division.

The said workshop was participated in by practitioners, entrepreneurs, economists, academicians, and experts from the 21 APO member economies which include Philippines. Distinguished seasoned resource speakers from Fiji, Malaysia, and Singapore shared their knowledge and expertise on enhancing business productivity. Moreover, workshop focused on practice-based and data-driven strategies in navigating the volatility of the MSME sector worldwide while excellently and innovatively meeting the needs of the customers and at the same time maintaining a culture of productivity.

After the said APO-sponsored workshop, Mr. Manegdeg and Mr. Sumalabe took the center stage of cascading their pieces of learning and insights to the rest of the Institute last October 7, 2021. They have virtual echo workshop facilitated a participated by staff from the four ISSI divisions. The session focused localizing the productivity strategies and interventions that can be helpful for entrepreneurs in businesses and country that ISSI works for and with, specifically in harnessing their operational efficiency, institutionalizing technologybusiness mediated processes, and expediting decision-making.

The half-day echo workshop kicked off with a session on the emerging economic issues and trends in the Asia-Pacific region and productivity concepts that can bring about value addition, business excellence, and productivity to MSMEs. The first session allowed the participants to be mindful of the prevailing disruptions and risks in this day and age like the COVID-19 pandemic, hence take note of possible interventions and strategies in helping **MSMEs** circumvent costly business inactivity due lockdowns while to safeguarding its resources, employees, assets, and customers.

The second half of the echo workshop focused on applying the productivity concepts, tools, and techniques to a given scenario. This session paved the way for participants to understand importance of adaptive and proven strategies in surviving unforeseen events that may disrupt the operations of a business. Since the participants were provided with the necessary productivity tools and techniques, they need to provide collective findings their recommendations to the management of a crisis keeping in mind that it must lead to productivity and quality improvement.

In order to do this, a breakout session conducted in order for the participants to share their ideas and thoughts on the case study. The groups shared their output at the plenary where thev presented their key findings, productivity indicators (e.g. value addition resource in management, labor productivity, capital productivity, etc.), and their respective action plans in addressing the productivity challenges based on the data provided. Mr. Manegdeg and Mr. Sumalabe provided their feedback to the participants afterward.

The MSME productivity tools that were echoed by the speakers are considerably helpful in overcoming serious consequences of this global health crisis and other disruptions in the future. Also, these tools will be of value in setting forth the vital elements of resilient. sustained, and profitable approaches suitable for the post-COVID-19 world. The echo workshop on MSME productivity is a concrete expression of ISSI's commitment to the promotion and development of MSMEs especially as they build back better and contribute to galvanizing the economy amid the pandemic.

# 2 UP ISSI staff attend APO-DAP Workshop on "Regulatory Ecosystems for Startups"

Two staff from the University of the Philippines Institute for Small-Scale Industries (UP ISSI) attended the Workshop on "Regulatory Ecosystems for Startups", sponsored by the Asian Productivity Organization (APO) and implemented by the Development Academy of the Philippines (DAP).

The workshop aimed to equip participants on the startup ecosystems and their regulatory frameworks that support and accelerate startup success, and to examine existing public regulations and tools that promote startup business. Ms. Marsha Lee A. Delfinado of the Business and Enterprise Development Division (BEDD) and Ms. Melanie V. Cabotaje of the Research Division (RD) attended the workshop on July 28-30, 2021, from 1 PM to 5:00 PM (Japan Time) via virtual sessions. This was participated in by twelve (12) countries with a total of 39 registered participants and eight (8) local observers.

Here's what Ms. Cabotaje and Ms. Delfinado have to say about the workshop:

"I found the workshop informative and useful, as it provided us with new knowledge and insights about the start-up ecosystem, particularly the experiences and realities in other countries. The learnings we gained gave us a fresh perspective about start-ups e.g. different startup context parameters, factors, metrics per country and in the global context, something which we can apply in our research and extension work.

As mentors and coaches and even program leaders to MSME programs and projects (including start-ups and university spin-offs), we learned that there is a need to calibrate our mindset considering the startup ecosystems in other countries. We also need to collaborate with other startup enablers and stakeholders and strengthen linkages in the ecosystem, especially that of the Philippines because it is generally fragmented. There is a need to catch up (even leapfrog) in terms of developing the MSME sector to provide a flourishing and thriving environment for startups to be more competitive in the global market." "The small group discussions gave us an opportunity to share our experiences and insights. There was this discussion wherein the participants were asked to share about what we thought were the top assistance needed by start-ups in order to sustain their operations and grow their enterprises, and even if we came from different countries, our answers were almost the same. This gave us a glimpse of what "start-up ecosystem" looks like across the globe.

The workshop gave us research ideas like looking into experiences of Filipino women who are running/managing start-up enterprises. And since in the Philippines, the way the government defines "start-ups" are more of those technology-based enterprises, it also gave us an idea to look into the practices of micro-entrepreneurs when it comes to technology adoption, what are their challenges and how this can be addressed." - Ms. Cabotaje

This workshop is particularly relevant at this time as the UP ISSI is currently implementing a start-up enabler program entitled, "Start-up Incubation Provider Tie-UP (SUIT-UP). Under this program, UP ISSI partners with business incubation providers. The Institute complements their programs with business mentoring and coaching services to equip start-up entrepreneurs in building successful enterprises amidst the challenges and difficulties.




